Civics & Engagement Committee presents "Thankful"

Civics and Engagement hosted an awesome interactive meeting with the theme of being "Thankful". Members were provided an opportunity to note on tags what they are thankful for and all "blessings tags" where hung at the front of the clubhouse. The meeting featured a moving tribute to those missing service members (full write on following page).

Our presenter, retired Clay County Judge Tim Collins, shared about his recently established not-for-profit called *Empowered to Achieve*. Judge Collins created this 501c to help offenders. The monies are used to help drug and alcohol offenders who encounter an unusual economic need during their recovery and rehabilitation period. An example is a recent program participant who had car trouble that prevented him from being able to get to work and kept him from attending required court ordered rehab meetings. Empower to Achieve saw the need and came forward to fund the necessary car repairs. This program not only benefits the defendants (veteran, drug, mental health courts only) but also our community if they are successful. The program is currently seeking 100 sponsor organizations and or individuals who will commit to contributing \$500 a year.

Missing Man Table

The Missing Man Table is a tradition that has been in place since the end of the Vietnam War. Thank you, Marnie Buchanan, for sharing this with us at the November meeting hosted by Civics Engagement.

Each item on the Missing Man Table represents the emotions and feelings reserved for those who did not come home.

The table is set for six representing the service members from each branch of service as well as the civilians who are missing, imprisoned or died in armed conflicts.

The table is **round**, to show **our everlasting concern for our missing men**.

The **cloth** is **white**, symbolizing the purity of their motives when answering the call to serve.

The single red rose; displayed in a vase, reminds us of the lives of these Americans and their loved ones and friends who keep the faith while seeking answers.

The red ribbon symbolizes our continued determination to account for our missing.

A slice of lemon reminds us of their bitter fate; captured and missing in a foreign land.

A pinch of salt symbolizes the tears of our missing and their families who long for answers after decades of uncertainty.

The lighted candle reflects our hope for their return, alive or dead.

The Bible represents the strength gained through faith to sustain us and those lost from our country, founded as one nation under God.

The glasses are inverted, symbolizing their inability to share a toast


The chairs are empty, the seats that remain unclaimed at the table but they are here with us in spirit.

In 1871, Green Cove Springs was chosen as the new seat for Clay County. The top photo features the first courthouse, a wooden structure built in 1878. This original courthouse stood just west of the current Senior Center, the site of the former Coca Cola bottling plant. This wooden structure was used for just two years until the brick structure currently featured at the Historical Triangle was ready. We thought you'd like to know!

6 Eco-Friendly Gift-Wrapping Ideas for a More Thoughtful Festive Season

- Fabric wrapping: Use linen napkins or placemats as they will also double as a much-loved gift.
- Holiday gift sacks: A low-waste, low-effort option for holiday gift-giving, and one your giftee can reuse season after season.
- Kraft paper: Opt for kraft paper as it's biodegradable and can be recycled. It will also give your gifts a lovely rustic look. Add some twine and a pine tree sprig for an extra festive touch.
- 4. Magazines/newspapers: Now is your chance to give another use to that pile of old magazines or newspapers you may have lying around!
- 5. Baskets/boxes: A perfect time to re-use any boxes or baskets sitting around e.g. cardboard delivery boxes from all those shopping purchases. If they look particularly shabby you can wrap them in kraft paper. Remember to keep any boxes you receive in the lead-up to Christmas.
- 6. Natural decorative elements: Try opting for dried citrus fruit or sprigs of thyme/leaves rather than bows and ribbons to elevate your gift's aesthetic, and they can be easily composted or put in the garden after use.
